VOTERS' ACCESS TO WATER ACT

- The *Voters' Access to Water Act* protects voters' access to water when they are made to wait in line outside polling places.
- Earlier this year, Georgia's GOP-controlled state legislature passed and Georgia Gov. Brian Kemp signed into law SB 202, which makes it a crime punishable by up to a year in jail for nonpartisan volunteers to provide bottled water for voters in line outside of polling places.
- The Voters' Access to Water Act directly addresses that provision in SB 202.
- The *Voters' Access to Water Act* would amend the *Help America Vote Act of 2002* to prohibit states from restricting volunteers from providing food or water to voters waiting in line as long as they are not engaging in political activity and as long as they offer food or water to every voter.
- Last year in the 2020 elections, voters were forced to wait sometimes <u>over 10 hours</u> to make their voices heard, braving the heat and long lines to exercise the sacred right to vote. During the 2018 midterm election, <u>more than 3 million voters</u> waited 30 minutes or longer to vote, surpassing the acceptable threshold for wait times set by the Presidential Commission on Election Administration.
- According to a <u>Georgia Public Broadcasting/ProPublica analysis</u>, Black voters in Georgia face disproportionately longer lines than white voters.
- That analysis found that there are fewer polling locations in predominately Black neighborhoods in Georgia, and that "about two-thirds of the polling places that had to stay open late for the June primary to accommodate waiting voters were in majority-Black neighborhoods, even though they made up only about one-third of the state's polling places."
